GRAND TOUR

17 DAYS IN OREGON AND WASHINGTON



1. PORTLAND – Discover the captivating beauty of Portland, Oregon. Immerse yourselves in the city's vibrant culture, from the enchanting gardens to the bustling food scene. Explore the iconic Powell's City of Books, visit the stunning waterfalls of the Columbia River Gorge, and indulge in local wines. Let Portland's charm and natural wonders create unforgettable memories.

2. PORTLAND – Pick up everything in Portland (everything!) without sales tax. From handmade items and vintage stores to designer goods, you'll find it all tax-free. If you want to go where the locals go, explore the city's diverse neighborhoods, filled with restaurants, bars, shops, and more.

3. NEWPORT – Drive through orchards, vineyards, and the Oregon Coast Range to reach scenic Highway 101 and the rugged coastline. A bustling seaport, Newport's activities include the Oregon Coast Aquarium, Rogue Brewery and boating and fishing excursions.

4. COS BAY – Coos Bay blends natural beauty with coastal adventure. Stroll along scenic shorelines, visit Shore Acres State Park for stunning cliffside vistas, and experience the

area's rich history and fresh seafood.

5. CRATER LAKE NATIONAL PARK – Created by the volcanic eruption of Mount Mazama 7,000 years ago, cobalt-blue Crater Lake is the nation's deepest lake. The annual snowfall of 533 inches (13.5 meters) makes it most accessible in summer.

6. BEND – Central Oregon, on the arid side of the Cascade Range, is a hub for recreation due to its proximity to mountains, rivers, lakes, and desert. Bend's abundant fine dining and shopping make it a popular resort destination.

7. FOSSIL – Painted Hills and overnight Fossil at a working ranch. Witness the breathtaking hues of Oregon's Painted Hills, where time and nature have crafted an iconic landscape. Unwind from the day at Wilson Ranches Retreat, a nearby working ranch.

8. PENDLETON – After a spectacular drive on Hells Canyon Scenic Byway, celebrate the 10,000-year-old traditions of local Native Americans at the Tamastslit Cultural Institute and spot modern-day cowboys in the home of the annual Pendleton Roundup rodeo.

9. SPOKANE – Journey through the Tri-Cities and picturesque Palouse to Spokane, the Lilac City. Explore this historic city, known for hosting the 1974 World's Fair, surrounded by stunning mountains, lakes, and outdoor adventures.

10. LEAVENWORTH – Travel onward to Leavenworth, a charming Bavarian-style village. Along the way, enjoy rolling hills nourished by the Columbia River. Don't miss visiting Wenatchee, known as the apple capital of the world.

11. BELLINGHAM – Head towards Bellingham, passing through scenic landscapes and step back in time at the western town of Winthrop. Experience breathtaking views of North Cascades National Park, with its jagged peaks, glistening waterfalls, and over 300 glaciers along the way. Or drive West on Hwy 2, open year-round.

12. SAN JUAN ISLANDS – From Anacortes, ferry across stunning waters to the San Juan Islands, keeping an eye out for graceful Orca whales. Friday Harbor, San Juan Island's largest town, offers many activities, including bike and moped rentals. San Juan Island draws history- and nature-lovers as well as

seekers of great island cuisine.

13. WHIDBEY ISLAND – Cross Deception Pass onto Whidbey Island and dive into island history and nature. Stop in Coupeville for delicious local cuisine.

14. PORT ANGELES – Return to the mainland through enchanting towns like Port Townsend. Drive up to Hurricane Ridge in Olympic National Park, where you'll be rewarded with incredible vistas to look for wildlife, including mountain goats.

15. SEATTLE – Take a scenic ferry ride from Bainbridge Island across Puget Sound for stunning views and a relaxing escape. Then, explore the Seattle Waterfront's shops, restaurants, and iconic attractions like the Seattle Aquarium and The Great Wheel.

16. SEATTLE – Visit iconic Seattle landmarks, such as the Space Needle and Chihuly Garden and Glass. Don't miss the Museum of Pop Culture (MoPoP) or a guided food tour through Pike Place Market.

17. DEPARTURE – Bid the Pacific Northwest farewell — for now!

CULINARY TOUR

12 DAYS IN WASHINGTON AND OREGON



1. SEATTLE – This is the perfect spot to start discovering the Northwest's fresh and savvy culinary scene — a scene that has enraptured enthusiastic foodies and visitors from around the globe. Why not begin at bustling Pike Place Market, home to the first Starbucks and over 500 vendors and food purveyors?

2. SEATTLE – Savor Seattle's culinary scene by exploring neighborhoods like Capitol Hill, where innovative restaurants and cozy cafés serve everything from locally sourced seafood to global fusion dishes. Try clam chowder on the Waterfront or head into the International District for a bowl of filling Vietnamese pho.

3. MUKILTEO & WODINVILLE – Travel from Seattle

to Mukilteo and Woodinville, stopping by Boeing's Future of Flight Museum. Visit Woodinville's historic district to taste a variety of wines produced throughout the state.

4. YAKIMA – Journey to Yakima as you head towards Snoqualmie Pass. Delight in the picturesque Cascade Mountains and check out the impressive wine country. The Yakima Valley is also the top U.S. producer of beer hops.

5. WALLA WALLA – Explore the Tri-Cities, where farmers markets abound with fresh produce, and charming, walkable downtown Walla Walla. Both cities offer wine tasting galore.

6. PORTLAND – It's a well-established fact: Portland is one of the world's great food

cities. Restaurants, food carts, markets, craft breweries, and nearby wineries reflect the importance of fresh, local, and sustainable ingredients.

7. PORTLAND – Explore Portland's food scene, catering to all budgets and cravings. From food carts to fine dining, there's a meal for everyone. Don't miss the delights of farmer's markets, iconic Portland doughnuts, and more!

8. WILLAMETTE VALLEY – Discover Oregon wine country via a guided wine tasting at a renowned Willamette Valley vineyard, learning about the region's Pinot Noir. Spend two nights at the Vintages RV Resort.

10. SOUTHERN OREGON – Drive south down the agriculturally rich Willamette Valley (past

Woodburn Company Stores), selecting a few of the many wineries to visit. Stop in Salem or Eugene before reaching the forested hills — and yet more wineries — around Medford.

11. SOUTHERN OREGON – Explore several wine appellations on a Southern Oregon Farm driving tour. Then, visit the Tudor-style village of Ashland, home to the renowned Oregon Shakespeare Festival (February-October) and sumptuous dining opportunities.

12. DEPARTURE FROM OREGON – Continue south to San Francisco (360 miles/585 km), or fly out of Rogue Valley International Airport (RVI) in Medford.

COASTS & PEAKS TOUR

11 DAYS IN OREGON AND WASHINGTON



1. PORTLAND – Surrounded by the Pacific Northwest's natural beauty and boasting over 200 urban parks, Portland exudes culture, award-winning dining, and irresistible, tax-free shopping. Cruise scenic rivers, stroll through the International Rose Test Garden, get lost in Powell's City of Books, and enjoy a bounty of local beers, wine, and culinary delights.

2. PORTLAND – Continue exploring Oregon's largest city, made up of dozens of unique neighborhoods. Wander through markets of handcrafted treasures, savor locally grown fare, and discover fascinating museums.

3. LINCOLN CITY – Pastoral roads lead through vineyards, farmlands and ancient evergreen forests to the rugged coast. Legendary Highway 101 hugs the shoreline from Cannon

Beach south past dairies and wildlife refuges to Lincoln City.

4. EUGENE – Discover Eugene, where old-growth forests meet modern art. See the town like a local by hiking Spencer Butte, biking scenic trails, or watching a meet at Hayward Field. All while immersing yourself in the vibrant arts scene with world-class performances and colorful murals.

5. DUFUR/KAHNEETA – Travel from ranchlands to the Kahneeta Resort- wellness stop with views of the Cascades and Oregon's high desert, then overnight at the historic Balch Hotel.

6. MOUNT RAINIER – Back in Washington, drive through scenic White Pass and immerse yourself in the lush ancient forests and subalpine meadows of Mount Rainier

National Park. Revel in breathtaking views from Paradise Inn, a perfect spot for admiring the majestic 14,410-foot peak.

7. LAKE QUINALT – Venture west to the idyllic Olympic Peninsula, where Lake Quinalt offers a serene escape. Explore the temperate Quinalt Rainforest trails or unwind by the tranquil waters of the lake, adjacent to Olympic National Park.

8. PACIFIC COAST: FORKS TO PORT ANGELES – Discover the rugged beauty of the Pacific Coast, traveling from Forks to Port Angeles. Experience dramatic coastal scenery, explore quaint towns, and enjoy the stunning ocean vistas along the way.

9. SEATTLE – Seattle offers one-of-a-kind attractions, like Pike Place Market, the Space Needle (built for the 1962 World's Fair), Chihuly Garden and Glass, and Boeing Factory Experience.

10. SEATTLE – Dozens of museums and performance venues reflect the city's unique cultural vision. Explore pop culture at MoPoP, take in a concert by a local musician, or learn about the region's natural history at The Burke Museum.

11. DEPARTURE – Remember to make a list of all the things you'll do on your next trip to the Northwest.
